Statement of Need and Background	Out of 29 million Nepali citizen, 40 % or about 12 million are children under the age of 18. Although Nepal has made great strides in reducing childhood mortality and morbidity rates, majority of children are deprived of basic healthcare and access to specialized care. They have to travel to urban centres to seek general care. KIOCH aims to provide access to healthcare by establishing a network of hospitals around the country.
